**Personal Statement**-Please use the writing prompt below as a guide for your statement.

Writing prompt: The School Counseling program at the IU Indianapolis School of Education, prepares school counselors to be transformational agents fostering equity and justice, and valuing diversity. Transformational school counselors challenge barriers to educational opportunity relating to poverty, gender, (dis)ability, race, ethnicity, and home language, among others. In preparation for this work, our students engage in ongoing discussions and critical analyses of school organizations, the application of counseling theories and research, and the roles and responsibilities of counselors as change agents and advocates in responding to the diverse needs of students in all schools. This work demands the ability to reflect and respond in written and oral form.

Your personal goal statement should be no more than three double-spaced pages, with 12-point font.

# **Two Letters of Recommendation**

The letters of recommendation must be professional, on letterhead, and signed. Select recommenders who can attest to and describe your character, skillset, experiences, and abilities.

Please note: The application will require you to submit your recommender's email; an email request will automatically be sent to the recommender on your behalf.

#### **Transcripts**

Submit an unofficial transcript for each academic institution

Note: If you completed your degree outside of the U.S., you must submit a World Education Services (WES ICAP) evaluation report.
